## Dernancourt School Homework Policy

Learning is a lifelong process and children benefit when families and schools work in partnership. At Dernancourt School we value the active support and involvement of parents in the education process; this includes regular work at home (homework) is undertaken.

## RATIONALE

We believe that homework:

- Reaffirms the role of parents and caregivers as partners in education
- Provides parents and caregivers with insights into what is being taught in the classroom and the progress of their child
- Provides parents with opportunities to share in their child's learning
- Strengthens home-school links
- Allows for practicing, extending and consolidating work done in class
- Provides training for students in planning and organising their time
- Establishes habits of study, concentration and self-discipline which will serve students for the rest of their lives
- Provides students with opportunities to complete tasks begun in class
- Plays an essential role in children's learning and academic progress
- Is a valuable part of schooling

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| Reading is to be heard each night of the school week (using readers set by the teacher at a level which the child can read independently) <br> Activities which relate to classroom programs (e.g. learning sight-words, spelling, preparing oral language presentations) may be set as required 15-20 minutes/night | However, many activities at home and in play can assist a child to develop a wide range of knowledge and skills. Language and number concepts can be introduced and practised in many family activities including: <br> - Shopping <br> - Reading and library borrowing <br> - Writing letters and speaking with relatives on the phone <br> - Listening to stories, learning songs and nursery rhymes <br> - Conversations <br> - Family outings <br> - Some computer games and apps <br> - Playing card and board games with siblings <br> - Collecting items like stamps, coins, things for oral presentations <br> - Helping to prepare food. |

| Reading is to be heard each night of the school week (using readers set by the teacher at a level which the child can read in dependently). <br> Children are also expected to practise spelling words and undertake other activities related to their curriculum as required. <br> Numeracy practice should occur at least once a week. <br> Homework averages out to no more than: <br> Year 3 20-25 minutes/night <br> Year 4 25-30 minutes/night | Reading for pleasure should be done each night; some students at least once a week. <br> Children are also expected to practise spelling words and undertake other activities related to their curriculum as required. <br> Numeracy practice should occur at least once a week. <br> Homework averages out to no more than: <br> Year 5 30-40 minutes/night <br> Year 6 30-40 minutes/night |

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## RESPONSIBILITIES OF TEACHERS

- $\quad$ Students are given opportunity to write homework in their diaries
- A realistic time expectation is placed on the completion of homework
- Where large projects (primary years and middle school students) are issued as homework, the written criteria for assessment are provided to the students at the start of the project
- If homework is given, it is checked/marked and feedback is given (relative to the size of the homework).


## RESPONSIBILITIES OF STUDENTS

- Students write their homework in diaries daily
- Primary and Middle School students will communicate with their teacher any issues early if there are any difficulties in completing the homework in the set time.


## RESPONSIBILITIES OF PARENTS/CAREGIVERS

- Parents encourage students to complete their homework and check their diaries daily
- Communicate any issues regarding home work with the classroom teacher
- Parents may chose to complete additional "homework" with their child at home.


## SOME ADVICE TO PARENTS

- Communicate any concerns with the class teacher as soon as possible if your child is having difficulty with the content or the completion of homework
- Homework is best done at a quiet time, set aside for homework completion
- Completing homework in front of the television is not recommended
- Typically children will become more independent and responsible for their homework as they reach primary and middle school years, especially if good habits have been established in the early years
- Any issues regarding the quantity or type of homework should be addressed per our School Grievance Policy.
